

ADVANCING SOUTHERN ILLINOIS

PRIORITY ONE: BUSINESS GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Eldorado-based Compressed Energy Solutions (CES) recently cut the ribbon on a unique project that rethinks renewable energy. Owner Chris Schimp and CES have been capturing methane, or natural gas, which builds up in abandoned coal mines, for years. With a tap on the Texas Eastern Transmission Pipeline which runs right through Saline County, CES has been selling this naturally occurring energy source all over the United States.

With the demand for natural gas increasing, Schimp thought it was the perfect time to explore new ways to capture methane beyond just abandoned coal mines. That's where the idea for his project, Saline Biogas Digesters, came about. Sitting atop a small hill between Harrisburg and Southeastern Illinois College, CES has two one-million-gallon concrete tanks, which are filled with manure from cows and pigs. Heated to 98° to simulate a stomach, microorganisms break down the manure and release methane. Typically, on a farm, this occurs in a lagoon system, and the methane is simply lost into the atmosphere, which is 30 times more potent as a greenhouse gas compared to carbon dioxide. In this facility, CES is able to capture the methane before it's released, piping it into the Texas Eastern Transmission Pipeline to be used as natural gas in homes and businesses throughout the country.

Once the manure is used, it's then given back to farmers to be spread over fields and used as fertilizer. The transport of the manure to and from the facility is all done using a fleet of semi-trucks that have been converted to run on the captured natural gas.

October is national Manufacturing Month. Southern Illinois boasts a robust manufacturing sector, with **281 manufacturers** calling the region home. Your first thoughts might immediately go to some of the area's larger manufacturers like AISIN, Continental Tire, or Gilster-Mary Lee, but Southern Illinois is home to dozens of small to medium sized manufacturers that are often quietly producing products that are used around the globe.

From products used to clean up oil spills, to custom plastic packaging, to commercial explosives, it's made right here in Southern Illinois. As of Q1 2024, manufacturing employs 13,980 people in Southern Illinois, marking the highest number of people in this sector in nearly six years. In fact, the region has added over 330 manufacturing jobs in the last 12 months, making it one of the fastest growing industries in Southern Illinois, just below healthcare. Manufacturing has long been seen as one of the keys for developing and keeping a healthy middle class across the United States.

In Southern Illinois, the average annual wage for a manufacturing employee is \$61,651, which is 20-percent higher than the average wage for all industries in the region. Southern Illinois' central location, which provides close proximity to suppliers and customers will continue to be an asset that for manufacturers in the area. We should be proud of all that's made in the area and if you know someone that is working for one of the area's manufacturers, be sure to thank them this month!

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS' TOURISM ECONOMY SHOWS MORE GROWTH IN 2023



Whether it's a relaxing weekend getaway in the Shawnee National Forest, a bike ride on the tunnel hill trail, or an adventureous kayaking trip among the cypress knees on the Cache River. Tourism is flourishing and has become a significant contributor to the Southern Illinois economy with visitors spending over \$891 million in 2023 right here in the region. (Tourism Economics) That is \$35 million higher than 2022 -a 4-percent increase.

Tourism also resulted in 5,806 jobs in Southern Illinois and contributed \$57 million directly and indirectly in local taxes to the region.
