The facility's adaptable design allows for quick reconfiguration to address changing training needs, establishing it as a vibrant hub for both learning and production, set to drive economic growth and new opportunities across Southern Illinois.

"The academy is not just about education; it's about building a skilled workforce that can meet the demands of modern manufacturing," says Chris Sink, Director of SIMA. The curriculum is comprehensive, offering everything from basic mechanical and electrical training to advanced robotics and programmable logic controllers (PLC). In addition to traditional manufacturing programs, the facility will also train students in the confectionery arts while manufacturing chocolate as part of its hands-on curriculum. 

ADVANCING SOUTHERN ILLINOIS

SIU CARBONDALE: \$4.7 BILLION IN ECONOMIC IMPACT

Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC), the flagship campus of the Southern Illinois University System, is a powerhouse of economic influence throughout Southern Illinois, generating a staggering \$2.7 billion in total economic impact annually through university operations, student expenditures, visitor spending and alumni income. SIUC's economic activity helped support 18,601 jobs directly and indirectly throughout the state of Illinois.

Investing in SIU yields impressive returns for both taxpayers and students. In total, the SIU System's economic impact in fiscal year 2023 reached \$4 billion and supported more than 45,000 direct and indirect jobs in Illinois. For every dollar taxpayers invest in SIU, the return on investment (ROI) is \$1.81 in public benefits. This underscores the SIU's role as a force, training the workforce of tomorrow while fueling statewide economic growth.



SIUC Chancellor Austin Lane noted, "...the State of Illinois and our students are seeing a significant return on the investment of tax dollars and tuition in benefits for the regional economy and long-term impact on Salukis' income - not to mention the great discoveries and wonderful creative works that influence and change lives within and outside Illinois."

Every community that Deb, Tricia, and I visit is unique in its own way, but the people seem to all have this renewed sense of pride and compassion for seeing their community thrive. Many communities in Southern Illinois are seeing a resurgence in their downtowns driven by people with a vision. From river to river and I-64 to Cairo, there are people in Southern Illinois that are working to make a difference.

2025 looks to be a BIG year in Southern Illinois for business growth. There are multiple projects that are inching closer to the finish line with promised investment and job growth. If you've been in Du Quoin recently, you may have seen Prysmian's expansion just across Highway 51 from

80 new jobs and increasing the plant's production of insulated medium-voltage transmission cable. Manner Polymers in Mt. Vernon is going up quickly as the construction on the **\$54 million** new polymer compounds manufacturing facility is on track to open in late 2025. Crucial MRO in Murphysboro is working to convert the former Curwood factory into a state-of-the-art aviation component shop and creating **25 jobs**. The Material Works in Red Bud is continuing to expand its operations. SGI River Terminal will begin construction on a fertilizer distribution center in Shawneetown. Marion's transformational Star Bond Project will boost sports tourism and bring **thousands of people to the region**. There is tremendous momentum and I'm excited to see what is to come in 2025.
